

“Jesus Is...The Overcomer”

Use this guide as a tool to help you prepare to experience spiritual transformation in a practical way. It is a flexible guide that will help you discover, own, and apply the truths of God’s Word.

Message Summary

Jesus said to His disciples on the shores of the Sea of Galilee, “*Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men!*” These men dropped their nets and followed Him. But who were they following? Prior to this invitation, Matthew gives us a picture of the Man they decided to follow. As a matter of fact, he gives us no less than 20 pictures of Jesus. David Platt, who identified these 20 pictures, said, “This Jesus is worthy of more than nominal adherence and church association...it’s either turn and run or bow and worship.”

This Jesus is the Promised Offspring that will crush Satan’s head and bless the whole world. He is the Promised King Whose reign has begun and He demands our allegiance. He is the Promised Messiah Who rules with authority as King; representing God to us as Prophet and us to God as Priest. He is the Promised Savior Who will save you from the bondage and consequences of sin. He is the Center of History and no other person, population, or power can change the fact that Jesus is the One toward Whom all of history before and after Him points. He is the God-Man; man’s perfect God and God’s perfect Man. This Jesus is Sovereign over the wise and Shepherd over the weak. Jesus is also the Inaugurator of the New Exodus. Just as the blood of the lamb over the doorposts of the Jews in Egypt inaugurated the Exodus from Egypt, God in His great mercy inaugurated a New Exodus from sin through the blood of His Son. Jesus is the Ender of our Exile. He is our only hope for ending our exile in sin. While hope is near, repentance is necessary, and deliverance is sure. Jesus is the Lover of His Fiercest Enemies. By the end of Matthew 2, we discover that everyone is out to kill Jesus. But Jesus pursued those who pursued Him. He suffered and died in their place. He received them to Himself. Jesus loves His fiercest enemies. Chapter 3 begins with John the Baptist who introduces Jesus as the Savior-Judge. Jesus came to save a people for Himself but He will also judge those who turn their hearts against this Savior King. Jesus is the Son of God. Jesus came to John by the Jordan to be baptized. In His baptism we see Jesus was filled with God the Spirit and loved by God the Father. He was the Son of God.

Immediately after Jesus was baptized, the Spirit of God led Him to the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. Jesus was tempted in every way we are tempted, yet without sin (Hebrews 4:15). Yet we see that Jesus, the New Adam overcame the temptation to sin. Unlike the first Adam this Jesus withstood the lust of the eyes, the lust of the flesh, and the pride of life. We also see that He is the True Israel; the faithful and obedient Son of God. Unlike Israel, this Jesus always obeyed the Father’s will and worshiped Him alone. Therefore we can rest in Jesus’ finished work of obedience and sacrifice for our sin so we can have new life. This Jesus is worthy of worship and worthy to be followed and obeyed everyday!

As you prepare to meet with your Missional Community this week think through all that Jesus overcame for you. How do you respond on a daily basis to this Overcomer? Has it changed you? Do you worship and obey this Jesus?

Message Outline

Jesus is ...

1. The New Adam.

Jesus stood against the temptation to sin.

- He withstood the lust of the flesh.
- He withstood the pride of life.
- He withstood the lust of the eyes.

2. The True Israel.

Jesus was the faithful & obedient Son.

- Jesus obeyed God’s will rather than self-gratification.
- Jesus completely trusted God’s faithfulness and competence.
- Jesus insisted that only the Redeemer of Israel is worthy of worship.

Therefore...

1. In Jesus, the New Adam, we overcome sin and are made righteous.
2. In Jesus, the True Israel, we overcome unfaithfulness and are made sons & daughters.

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Group Discussion

Use the following questions to help make application of God’s Word to your Head (What God wants me to know), to your Heart (What God wants me to desire/value), and to your Hands (What God wants me to do).

In regard to Matthew 4:1-11:

1. What does this passage say about God’s character?
2. What is God doing here? How does this passage fit in the overall narrative of the Bible?
3. What is God saying about me?
4. Where am I not living by faith? How do I return to faith?
5. How should I practice this in everyday life?

Weekly Prayer Focus
